Then, they're back inside. Krystal has found some provocative apps that get their attention and the kids run with their own play from there. For example, a local amusement park has put some roller coaster rides on Youtube. The three boys dig out their Lego and build their own roller coasters. While constructing they tweak, ask questions and problem solve together. One of the boys salvages the device from his remote control car to apply to a ferris wheel. He is intrigued by the mechanics of it. Meanwhile, the other son has more of a marketing angle, thinking about how to name and promote the ride. The youngest is interested in building the tallest ride he can.

Krystal says it's fun to watch them, "It doesn't look like they're collaborating but they are! They are free to explore and be creative, while I get some work done. I am not worried because I know they are learning as they play." Here's the best part. The kids are having a blast while the world sits on pins and needles.





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
